From the council president...

National 4-H Week



The first week of October is National 4-H Week. I think of the entire month of October as 4-H Month. It is a good time to reflect on 4-H, where it came from, and where we are going with it.

4-H was started about a hundred years ago, woven from two separate strands of innovation. Educators wanted to understand how children learn best, and how to give children a relevant education that would prepare them for a prosperous future. Scientists wanted to see agricultural innovation implemented. In 1902, an educator named A.B. Graham brought together educational and scientific innovation when he started an after school club in Clark County, Ohio, to teach school aged children about new methods of agriculture. The club was called the "Corn Growing Club" or the "Tomato Club".

A hundred years later, 4-H is one of the largest youth development organizations in the United States, serving over seven million youth. Most people think of 4-H as an organization that is all about agriculture. This is understandable, since 4-H started in a rural area to teach kids about agriculture. This point was brought home to me when I floated the idea of starting a robotics project and another 4-H parent responded that robotics was "not very 4-H". However, something like robotics is very 4-H if you believe, as I do, that 4-H is all about innovation. Yes, 4-H started as a club to teach kids about agriculture--about being on the cutting edge of agriculture by using the latest technology.

In the 21st century, 4-H continues to move with the times, providing youth with relevant education through project-based learning. In a time when school budgets are being cut, and anything but the 3-R's is being dropped from school curricula, 4-H is putting augmenting the 3-R's with S-E-T. Recognizing that the United States is falling behind the rest of the world in some crucial ways, 4-H has become one of the largest providers of Science, Engineering, and Technology education in the United States. 4-H members are learning about robotics, computers, community mapping with GPS, veterinary science, biosecurity, and much more.

National 4-H Week is a time to publicize 4-H. This week, and this month, bring a visitor to your club meeting or recruit a new 4-H member. Get the word out that 4-H is not only about agriculture but that 4-H is also about innovation, SET, project-based learning, and above all, about making the best better.

Community Service: Beach Cleanup

September 17th, 2011 was the 26th annual California Coast Cleanup Day. About twenty San Rafael 4-H'ers, plus a few friends and family members, picked up trash at McNear's Beach in San Rafael. Last year more than 82,504 volunteers from all over California picked up a total of 1,224,663 million pounds of trash and recyclables from California beaches, rivers, and lakes.

It is important to pick up trash off the beach. If it is in the ocean, it can choke sea life. Fish consume plastic and birds eat styrofoam because they think it looks like fish eggs. It is not good for the animals to consume plastic because it not nutritious. Also, if fish eat plastic, and we eat the fish, then we are eating plastic.



Keep Your Chickens Busy

At the September poultry project meeting we made "chicken busy blocks". What is a chicken busy block, you are asking? A chicken busy block is a block made of scratch and gelatin that chickens can peck. It keeps your chickens entertained. There are not very many chicken toys out there but this is a combined treat and toy.

Chicken Busy Block Recipe

1/2 cup cold water
1-1/2 cups boiling water
4 packets unflavored gelatin
8 cups of scratch

First, we mixed four envelopes of unflavored gelatin into 1/2 cup cold water. (You have to mix the gelatin into the cold water first because if you put it directly into hot water, it will turn into hard little globs.) Next, we boiled 1-1/2 cups of water and mixed it into the cold water/gelatin mix. Stir the gelatin mixture into 8 cups of scratch. Press into one large mold or several small molds. Refrigerate over night. In the morning, you can give it to your chickens and watch them eat it.

At the project meeting, everybody brought 1 cup of scratch. We added 1/4 cup of the gelatin mix. The project members mixed it and they pressed it into a cup. A paper Starbucks cup works well. You can mix it in the cup that you are using as your mold. Everybody enjoyed doing this project.

The heart of the 4-H youth development program is the collection of talented volunteers who lead clubs and projects for our youth members. The breadth of projects that a member can take in a club is a direct result of volunteers who decide to share their interest or passion with their club members and lead a project.

Would you like to become a leader? It's easy! We have curriculum, outlines and training to help you get a project started.

Leaders need to attend a New Leader orientation and be fingerprinted for clearance. Sometimes our scheduled orientations don't work for busy folks, and I am happy to work your schedule.

- Ask your neighbors

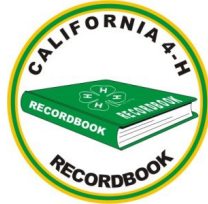

Click on **“Programs”** under the header to find a pull down menu. Click on **“4-H Program”** which will be the first on the list.

Once on the 4-H page, look to the left-hand margin and click on the button for On-line Enrollment. This will take you to the enrollment page with complete instructions and links to the enrollment system.

Please print the medical form, fill it out, and give it to your Community Club Leader at your first meeting along with a check for \$20 for each youth member and \$6 for each adult leader.

Note: If your child is an officer or a Jr./Teen leader, please indicate that they are a “volunteer” by checking the bubble on the first enrollment page. (It’s just before the “ethnicity” box.
