FROM THE PRESIDENT....

GPS for Personal Success

The 4-H year is drawing to a close and we are heading into the summer fair season. Our members have worked hard throughout the 4-H year. As we wind up the 4-H year, record books are due in July. Members will be taking stock of their 4-H work, tallying up the boxes in their PDR grids to see whether they will advance to the next Star rank. This is a good time for us to spend time with our members and children, to reflect on how they did with the goals they set for this year, and what their goals are for the coming year.

This year, California 4-H began its roll-out of the Thrive Program. The Thrive Program is like a 3-legged stool. The three legs are *Sparks*, *Growth Mindset*, *and GPS* (*Goal Setting*, *Pursuit of Strategies* & *Shifting Gears*). In previous articles, I have written about *Sparks and Growth Mindset*. This month, I will discuss *GPS*: *Goal Setting*, *Pursuit of Strategies*, *and Shifting Gears*.

When we work with members on *Goal Setting*, we can help them choose goals that are meaningful, achievable and also challenging. *Pursuit of Strategies* means we help kids develop a plan for achieving those personally meaningful, challenging goals. When we talk about *Shifting Gears*, we help kids figure out what to do when things do not go according to plan--when they do not reach their goal, or their strategies do not seem to be working.

In today's competitive, over-achieving, "everybody's a winner" environment, many kids are robbed of important life skills that build resiliency, like *Goal Setting* and *Shifting Gears*. Kids become focused on appearances, on GPA, on winning at all costs. Many families gravitate to 4-H because it provides an antidote to this "everybody's a winner" mentality. Usually, in order for everybody to be a winner, it means that standards have been relaxed in order for every child to "get a trophy." In 4-H, we have found a way for everybody to be a winner AND feel the accomplishment from meeting certain standards.

The usual "everybody's a winner" mentality leads to kids giving up in the face of perceived failure, because they have not learned the life skill of persistence. In order to encourage kids who give up in the face of challenge, it is tempting to lower expectations so they can get an award. In the short term, kids may feel good because they got an award. But giving kids honors that they did not actually earn does not build self-esteem. Lowering our standards so that kids can get an award or a star actually undermines self-esteem. Kids build self-esteem by getting to the goal post, not by having the goal post moved to them. Kids build self-esteem from persisting in the face of challenge, not from having challenges removed. And kids are smart! They know when the standards been "eased" and they feel the sting of a watered-down achievement.

In 4-H, we use the Danish system for many of our competitions. In the Danish system, any member who achieves a certain level of proficiency earns an award. In the Danish system, everybody really can be a winner if they do the work and do a good job. As we work with kids on Goal Setting for the coming year, we can build their resiliency and self-esteem by encouraging them to choose challenging goals, rather than helping them figure out how to fill the PDR with things that are quick and easy, but do not present a challenge. As kids tally up their PDR's, we can foster their development by helping them figure out what they can do next year to reach their goals, build their life skills and enrich their 4-H experience.

NEW FOOD SAFETY FOR VOLUNTEERS!

Adult 4-H volunteers are invited to participate in the field-testing of an updated, enhanced online version of the food safety curriculum "Make It Safe, Keep It Safe." The testing is part of my sabbatical study to create a framework for delivering effective, efficient online training for staff and volunteers.

Each club that prepares and serves food on behalf of UC and 4-H will need to have at least one leader trained in food safety. Leaders who participate in the field-testing will meet this requirement. Information needed includes: email address, name, and county. This information will be used only for tracking purposes. Field-testing is expected to begin in late June. The estimated time to complete the training is 45 minutes to 1 hour. The enhanced version will be Power Point based, and will include activity demonstrations.
