Going to Sorella's Caffe in Fairfax is like going home for a special meal with your extended family. We waited in the foyer next to a gigantic copy of the head of Michelangelo's David. Then Soya, who co-owns Sorella with her sister (Sorella means sister in Italian), greeted us with hugs and asked about school and our families.

She is happy to see us -- the Teen Social Project group of the Nicasio 4-H Club. Our project brings all the high schoolers in our club together once a month to have dinner at a local restaurant. (We each get a turn at choosing which one.) At the restaurant, we get a chance to talk about what's going on in our lives, as well as learning how to split a bill, figure out a tip, and write a restaurant review.

Our adult leader, Elizabeth Strasen, and other 4-H parents, tactfully sat at a table on the other side of Sorella's during dinner.

Soya seated us in the front room, at the window, where we could watch the people walking by on the street while perusing the menu and listening to the excited chatter all around us. Sorella's is a welcoming place, with a friendly and exciting atmosphere. It was Saturday night, so it was a bit loud and very busy. (We noticed when we went to the back of the restaurant that the tables back there were quieter than the ones in front.)

Later in the evening there was live music.

We ordered: gnocci; spinach ravioli; pasta primavera; and Pollo alla Sorella. While we waited for our food to arrive, a waiter came with an enormous wheel of parmesan and chipped off chunks of it onto each of our plates. The 'big cheese' is definitely a plus.

The service was good. Our waitress was enthusiastic, and the busboys kept our water glasses full. The food arrived in good time, with big portions, and very rich and flavorful. The primavera was delicious, with fresh and varied vegetables. The Pollo alla Sorella was also good, and really large, so that some was taken home.

For dessert, we ordered a single order of tiramisu, and split it four ways. This was perfect because it was too large for one person to eat by themselves. The tiramisu was light, fluffy, and delicious. Once we were finished, a waiter came by with a dish of brightly colored gummy bears, a perfect end to the meal.

The Point Reyes-Olema 4-H Club Celebrates National 4-H Week

Point Reyes Station, CA, October 8, 2013 -- The week of October 7-13, 2013 is National 4-H Week. More than 6 million young people across the country are celebrating, including the local Point Reyes-Olema 4-H Club. This year, the Club has decided to mark the occasion by reaching out to local businesses and organizations that have been stalwart supporters of the club. The Club's National 4-H Week Committee members will be visiting these supporting businesses and presenting them with a certificate of appreciation. Those being recognized include Marin County Farm Bureau, Toby's Feed Barn, Wells Fargo Bank, West Marin School, Cabaline, Black Mountain Weavers, Saltwater, Bovine Bakery, Bloom, Susan Hayes, and The Thrift Store

"We wanted to make sure that the businesses in our community that support 4-H are recognized," said Camilla Taylor, Point Reyes-Olema 4-H Club National 4-H Week Co-Chair "It is because of these generous organizations that our 4-H club continues to thrive and we can continue as a leader of youth development in our community."

In the past year, the Point Reyes-Olema 4-H Club has visited and decorated the Stocksill House for holidays, prepared food for the Community Thanksgiving feast, taken part in the annual Coastal Cleanup at Limantour beach, baked holiday treats for local seniors, hosted a community Easter egg hunt, volunteered for the Tomales History Center Tea, hosted and coordinated the Western Weekend 4-H Exhibit Fair, sponsored two local youth to attend summer camp and our own club President to attend 4-H State leadership conference at UC Davis. A momentous occasion this past year was receiving the Grand Prize for the Club's self designed and constructed float in the Western Weekend Parade.

While members are engaged in supporting the community they are also actively learning new knowledge and skills through their 4-H Projects. Each project is given a small stipend to be used for project materials to keep the expenses to a minimum for volunteer project leaders. This year club projects include: science literacy, photography, clothing & textiles, fiber arts, cooking, market swine, dairy cattle, cake decorating, arts & crafts, horse, dog care and training, poultry, goats and shooting sports. A new project being developed this year is a Cloverbud project which supports primary members ranging from ages 5-8.

Research has proven that participation in 4-H has a significant positive impact on young people. Recent findings from the Tufts University 4-H Study of Positive Youth Development indicate that, when compared to their peers, young people in 4-H are:

- Nearly 4 times more likely to contribute to their communities,
- Two times more likely to pursue healthy behaviors, and
- Two times more likely to engage in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) programs in out-of-school time.

DIVERSITY & INCLUSION Youth Adult Partnerships

This article, the second in a series, centers on youth adult partnerships as a way to empower youth, while promoting and encouraging the diversity of the program and community.

Studies show that youth adult partnerships promote positive youth development, increase civic engagement, and support community change. Best practices are those that include: authentic decision-making, mutuality, and connecting to the community. This approach, particularly authentic decision-making, attracts and retains low-income, vulnerable, and minority youth. To connect to the community, youth need meaningful roles. The feeling of being a part of something larger can also increase the awareness of differences among diverse people...sharing cultures and perspectives while having a common cause. As a result, youth perception is more positive, and relationships, organizations and communities are strengthened.

There are many county activities that demonstrate successful youth adult partnerships with authentic and meaningful roles. Youth and adults were resources to each other as they mutually created an agenda and carried out an action plan, taking joint responsibility for the outcomes. Having youth in these community service roles promotes peer relationships and demonstrates youth as leaders.

One example is Marin's Embryology Program. Supported by county staff and adult leaders, 4-H youth members provide educational presentations to children in grades K-2 in classrooms across Marin County through the "4-H in the Classroom: Embryology" outreach. Youth presenters share knowledge and expertise about egg hatching, brooding and caring for chickens. The presenters bring several visual aids, live chickens and samples of different eggs. The students in these classrooms participate in a complete life science unit on embryology and incubate, hatch and care for chicks in their own classroom. 4-H members are mentored by their leaders, and in turn, mentor the classroom teachers who deliver the curriculum to their students through their presentations and the teacher training workshop held each March.
