Statewide News

State Leadership Conference

The State Leadership Conference brings together high school youth from across California in a four-day leadership training, networking, and learning experi-

ence. Delegates stay in the campus residence halls, eat at the dining commons, participate in educational tracks in campus classrooms, and listen to motivational speakers. The conference will be held July 31- August 3 at the UC Davis campus. The fee



for this conference is \$385.00 per person. Registration packets are due by June 13 to the County 4-H office. Marin County youth may apply for financial aide. More information and forms are available at http://www.ca4h.org/conference/slc/ or contact the 4-H office at 499–4207.

Food Safety Education

To help minimize the risk of food borne illness at 4-H events where food is prepared and served, each 4-H club is to have at least one leader trained in a food safety education program approved by the county office. Leaders with a current national restaurant certification such as Serve Safe meet this requirement. The University food safety curriculum is entitled "Make It Safe, Keep It Safe." It is not a national certification program, but meets the University's minimum requirements for food safety education for leaders; this certification is good for a period of three years. Clubs that sell food to the public need to have at least one leader who holds either a national certification or participates in a training conducted by 4-H staff. Clubs who have leaders who have completed the online program include: San Rafael 4-H Club and Halleck Creek 4-H Riding Club. Included in this newsletter is an informational food safety brochure. Study on Youth Development

The California 4-H program has joined a Tufts University research study on youth development. The study will focus on youth ages 12-17, both 4-H and non-4-H members. The study will be followed up over the next two years. The 4-H staff will be conducting a second opportunity for youth to participate on Monday, June 9th, at the Dance Palace in Pt. Reyes. Each participant must complete a survey which takes approximately 1 hour. A \$10.00 gift card, along with dinner, will be provided to each youth. Members are encouraged to invite a friend. Written parental consent is required for youth to participate.

County-Wide Boat Project

The boat building and sailing project is under way. Youth have been working diligently on their small wood projects. The second session of the project will begin June 23rd. In the second session members will begin construction on a Norwegian Pram sailboat that they will then be sailing come September.
